3.0 SEAC Discussion/Question Period

E. Sproule asked if the previous month's minutes can be sent out earlier than just a week before our SEAC meetings. Superintendent Ruddock said that we can take that suggestion back to our next Agenda setting meeting.

Trustee Oliver asked Superintendent Ruddock around the recent labour discussions in the media. Is there anything that can be shared with SEAC at this point? Superintendent Ruddock commented that CUPE represents our caretakers and maintenance staff in our Board. These labour discussions do not impact our EAs and early childhood educators. Negotiations are at a provincial level not a board level. Discussions are ongoing and we are remaining optimistic. Our Board will have a plan with a commitment to continuity of learning should there be a CUPE strike.

4.1 Superintendent's Report

1. CCAT7 Administration: The process for the administration of the Canadian Cognitive Abilities Test begins in October. Families of Gr. 4 students attending in-person schools have been notified of the process and students will participate in the assessment in the coming weeks. On November 7th we start our ADHD Behavioural Management Workshop Series with Dr. Robert Sylvestri, providing parents with hands-on strategies to manage emotional dysregulation and build executive functioning skills in students. Where possible, we are also continuing to launch additional cohorts of programming for Reading Rocks, Mastering Mathematics, Social Skills, Next Steps and Executive Functioning to meet the huge demand we have seen over the last few weeks.
